

Stephen NAGY's main affiliation is as a professor at the International Christian University, Tokyo. Previously, he was a Special Research Associate at Waseda University (2007-2009) and an Assistant Professor at the Department of Japanese Studies at the Chinese University of Hong Kong (2009-2014). Concurrently, he is a fellow at the Canadian Global Affairs Institute (CGAI); a senior fellow at the Asia-Pacific Foundation, Canada (APFC); a visiting fellow with the Japan Institute for International Affairs (JIIA); a senior fellow at the Macdonald-Laurier Institute (MLI); Research Advisory Committee, Research Institute for Peace and Security (RIPS); and a senior fellow with the East Asia Security Centre (EASC). He serves as the director of policy studies for the Yokosuka Council of Asia Pacific Studies (YCAPS), spearheading their Indo-Pacific Policy Dialogue series and was formerly a governor with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce of Japan (CCCJ) where he represented the chamber at the Canadian Chambers of the Asia-Pacific (CCAP).

He has been teaching, researching and consulting on international relations and regional issues in the Indo-Pacific for over 25 years. He has a PHD in International Relations from Waseda University and is a multilingual expert on the political, economic, and national and economic security dynamics in the region, especially regarding China and Japan and the broader region. He is actively involved in various think tanks and 1.5/ 2.0 track dialogue both in Japan and abroad, as a senior fellow, visiting fellow, director, or governor. He has published widely in peer-reviewed journals, policy outlets, and media platforms, and has consulted for governments, businesses, and NGOs. Some of the topics I have worked on include CPTPP membership and expansion, supply chain diversification, Sino-Japanese relations, and middle power approaches to great power competition.
